
Kindness Café + Play Check Out This Neighborhood Gem!

with Your Greenbrier Neighbors

Join your neighbors on the Greenbrier Neighborhood Association (GNA) group email list! The list connects more than 450 Greenbrier households. The group email list, hosted by Groups.io is an effective means of communicating with other neighbors about upcoming GNA meetings or important neighborhood developments. It can also be used to let your neighbors know about a lost or found pet, borrow a tool, report a troublesome activity, share recommendations for tradespeople or service providers, or find out if others are having utility problems.

Unlike Nextdoor, the GNA email list is maintained and moderated by the GNA Executive Committee. The GNA list is private, so only GNA members can send and receive email from the list. It is also limited to households within our geographic neighborhood. You can control the number of emails you receive by adjusting your settings or mute an individual topic completely. To set your preferences, go to the bottom of any group email and click on the "Your Subscription" link. For help using **Groups.io**, visit **Help Center**.

In order to keep discussions relevant and courteous, we have established guidelines for the appropriate use of the list. GNA has modified the guidelines over the years to meet our changing needs. The current guidelines can be found in the Wiki section of our Group.io website at https://gna.Groups.io and on our public website at https://cvillegreenbrier.weebly.com We ask that all new and existing members review and follow the guidelines.

Road Construction Projects to Affect the Greenbrier Neighborhood

There are 2 major road construction projects that recently have been approved, fully funded, and will affect our neighborhood. VDOT proposes to construct multiple transportation improvements in the US 29 and Hydraulic Road area, and the City of Charlottesville will replace the Dairy Road Bridge over the 250 Bypass. Obviously, this construction, while welcome and sorely needed, may lead to periods of significant inconvenience for Greenbrier residents.



For the calendar year 2021, our treasury's ending balance was \$5,140. During the year, we received contributions of \$2,785 from 137 neighbors and spent \$1,421 on newsletters, credit card fees, and a donation to the Greenbrier School. We have currently committed \$1,000 to the **Let's Party Program** (see below) and were a Silver Sponsor for the Greenbrier School Frog Jog held on May 6, 2022.

PRTV (AGAIN)

The Greenbrier Neighborhood Association (GNA) Executive Committee renewed the continued use of a portion of our GNA dues for the important purpose of building a sense of community among the people who live in the Greenbrier Neighborhood.

The Let's Party Program will fund up to ten neighborhood parties and reimburse expenses up to \$100 per party to neighborhood residents who will host/organize a social gathering for their block or for some immediate neighbors around them. Residents can invite neighbors who they already know, but the main point is to also invite others around them who they don't know or don't know well. The funding can be used for food, rentals, paper products, or any other communal resource or amenity for the party. Consider inviting at least one GNA Executive Committee member, so they can also meet neighbors and spread good will.

Trail Update

The Charlottesville Parks and Rec Department has recently submitted a proposal to City Council for \$750,000 to build a bridge next to the current "rock hop" near Brandywine Drive, to construct a second bridge further upstream, and to

complete a path that would connect Michie Drive to Brandywine Drive. Although

City Council has not yet approved Parks and Rec's request,
the Greenbrier Neighborhood Association (GNA) Executive
Committee (EC) believes funding from a variety of sources is currently
available to the City, including approximately \$9 million in federal
government funds designated for pandemic relief, which has not been
allocated for use by the City. The federal rules for using this money
make it clear that one acceptable use is the creation and enhancement
of green space, parks, and exercise options for underprivileged
communities. The Michie Drive path falls squarely within this definition.

The EC has prepared an advocacy document in support of the Parks and Rec request with background information and a map. We recommend that Greenbrier residents who support this project make their voices heard. There are several ways in which to do this. If you are willing to speak during the public comment portion of any upcoming City Council meeting held on the first and third Monday each month starting at 6:30pm, you may request a three minute time slot at https://www.charlottesville.gov/692/Request-to-Speak The advocacy document provides talking points you can choose from to make during your presentation. The Botanical Garden of the Piedmont

The Botanical Garden of the Piedmont (BGP) has recently expanded to nearly 15 acres as a result of a land lease granted by the City of Charlottesville. BGP volunteers have been hard at work laying mulch-lined trails throughout the site. Later this fall, work will begin to restore the stream which currently bi-sects the Garden, and a bridge will be added to facilitate access to both sides of the park. Saving Trees From Clinging Vines

Did you know that Charlottesville's tree canopy coverage declined from 50% to 40% in the last 14 years? Plus, the rate of decline has more than doubled in the last four years. Neighborhoods below a 40% tree canopy are considered "heat islands" leading to higher energy costs and more heat related illnesses. ReLeaf Cville (https://www.releafcville.org) is a project initiated by the City's Tree Commission to plant, preserve and educate the public about the importance of trees. Greenbrier is fortunate to have a 55% tree canopy, but we must do our part to preserve the beautiful trees in our neighborhood. Controlling vines that can severely damage our trees is a good place to start.

If allowed to run rampant, unwanted vines can eventually engulf tree trunks, weakening the tree over time and leaving it susceptible to pests, disease, and wind damage as well as robbing it of sunlight and essential nutrients. Broken limbs from a weakened or dying tree can cause injuries to people and pets and have the potential to lead to costly home or car repairs.

There are several types of invasive vines found in Central Virginia, the most common being English Ivy. Vines growing up your trees or shrubs should be cut as low as possible with pruners or a saw. The vines above the cut will eventually shrivel up and die, exposing the tree to more sunlight. Pulling the vines off the tree above the cut is not advisable, as this could damage the bark. The vines below the cut should be hand pulled from the ground or removed through digging. If not, the stems below the cut will form new growth, and the vine will start climbing the tree once again. Once an invasive vine has been eliminated, trees are quick to recover. However, it is important to keep a watchful eye, as damages may be more extensive and hidden by the vine's foliage. Do not wait for cooler temperatures, as vines grow rapidly particularly in the summer months. Future Land Use/Zoning Changes Update

In late May or early June, the City will release a report that describes the changes suggested by the FLUM to the current zoning ordinances and how these proposed changes could affect development. Over the summer and into the fall, the City planning staff/consultants will simultaneously seek input from the public through various channels and from the Planning Commission and City Council. Based on that input, the aim is to have a draft of the rewritten zoning ordinances made available sometime in October, followed by more input from the public and decision-making bodies. It is anticipated that the draft will undergo changes as it moves through the approval process first by the Planning Commission and then by City Council. The ultimate approval should come in the Spring of 2023. Keep an eye out for information about this important process and sign up for our Greenbrier Neighborhood Association Group Email list to stay informed. We received a lot of thoughtful emails regarding the FLUM process and will likely experience that again during the Zoning rewrite.
